MORKING FOR THE SUS AFFECT N IC BENEFITS?

You can work for the U.S. Census AND keep certain needs-based benefits you may receive!

HOUSING & SHELTER PROGRAMS

Census earnings do not count as income for:

- The major federal and state housing programs including public housing, vouchers & subsidized housing
- Fuel assistance (LIHEAP) benefits
- The Emergency Assistance (EA) shelter program for homeless families



NUTRITION PROGRAMS

Census earnings do not count as income for:

- SNAP (food stamps) benefits
- Healthy Incentives Program (HIP) available to SNAP recipients



Census earnings may count for the following programs (unless you also receive SNAP):

- National school lunch and breakfast programs
- Women, Infant & Children's (WIC) benefits

CASH ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

Census earnings do not count as income for DTA cash assistance programs:

- TAFDC for families with children
- EAEDC for persons with disabilities or age 65+



Census earnings do count for persons who receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI), a program for persons with disabilities or age 65+.

Census earnings may count for Social Security Disability Insurance or Early Retirement benefits. Contact SSA for more information.

HEALTH PROGRAMS

Census earnings do not count as income for MassHealth for:

- Persons age 65+ or
- Persons who receive TAFDC, EAEDC or SSI cash benefits



For most other MassHealth members, Census earnings do count, but may not affect your MassHealth coverage.
