The SNAP figures above assume: (1) all household members are eligible for SNAP; (2) all of the household income is *earned* income; (3) there are no household members who are elderly (age 60+) or disabled.

These figures were produced using the following calculation:

Gross income to net income:

- (-) 20% of gross income: Allowed for ALL households
- (-) Standard deduction: Capped at \$167 for households of 1-3, \$178 for households of 4, \$209 for households of 5
- (-) Shelter deduction: Table A no shelter expenses claimed. Tables B and C math includes max shelter deduction of \$569
- (-) Child Care deduction: Table C math includes sample of either \$300 or \$600/month (no max limit on dependent care)
- = Net income after allowable deductions

Maximum SNAP allotment for household size:

- (-) Net income x 0.3 is subtracted from max SNAP allotment based on household size
- = <u>SNAP monthly benefit</u> for household based on income and size
