

# It's Time to Close the **SNAP**Gap

Reduce Hunger. Improve Health. Support the Economy.

Dear Governor Baker:

We, the undersigned anti-poverty, anti-hunger, and food justice organizations in Massachusetts, wish to thank you for establishing a COVID-19 Food Security Task Force in April, and for your strong leadership to improve the health, safety and food security of low-income Massachusetts residents during this unprecedented pandemic. We write to urge the Administration to implement a provision included in Section 2 of Chapter 151 of the Acts of 2020, An Act financing the general governmental infrastructure of the Commonwealth. In July, the Massachusetts Legislature authorized the Administration to finance \$5 million dollars (line item 4000-0123) for the purpose of developing a system to allow health care consumers to apply for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits at the same time. As the COVID-19 pandemic persists and the economic Recession deepens, we urge the Administration to use this financing to implement this systems change as quickly as possible.

Allowing health care consumers to apply for SNAP at the same time as they apply for or renew their MassHealth or Medicare Savings Program coverage has the potential to bring substantial federal nutrition dollars to needy residents, reduce health care costs and provide much needed economic stimulus. In December of 2019, EOHHS identified nearly 700,000 low-income residents receiving MassHealth but not SNAP benefits. Were Massachusetts to efficiently enroll even half (350K) of these residents in SNAP benefits, this could bring \$50 to \$60M per month in federal nutrition dollars into the Commonwealth. Developing this systems change is directly related to the state's COVID-19 response efforts:

- Boosting SNAP enrollment during the public health emergency means more households will qualify for the COVID-19 SNAP Emergency Allotment for each month where we have both a state and federal public health emergency declaration. This extra SNAP is especially important for many older adults and persons with disabilities who may only receive \$16/month in SNAP but now receive \$204/month, as well as for working households getting lower SNAP.
- Boosting SNAP enrollment creates automatic free school meal status for thousands more K-12 students, increases the ability of more school districts to qualify for the

federal universal free school meal (CEP) policy, and qualifies more students for Pandemic EBT benefits.

We sincerely appreciate the efforts by the Department of Transitional Assistance and Office of MassHealth to address the “SNAP Gap” including adding a short SNAP paper application to the MassHealth Senior application and deploying available staff at the MassHealth Enrollment Centers to phone call MassHealth recipients and offer to take a SNAP application. However, these two efforts have resulted in roughly 1,200 SNAP applications since March. Meanwhile, federal Medicaid.gov data from January through June 2020 shows that approximately 12,000 to 20,000 Medicaid applications are filed each month in the Commonwealth. We firmly believe that the best time to enroll individuals and families in the SNAP program is when they are affirmatively applying for or renewing their health care and can give their eligibility information for both programs at the same time.

The Governor’s COVID-19 Food Security Task Force has prioritized maximizing federal nutrition benefits to address food security needs in Massachusetts. Emergency food provided by food banks and food pantries cannot begin to meet this need. Nor does emergency food allow families the discretion to purchase the foods that meet their families’ diets and preferences. The most efficient, comprehensive route to maximize access to federal nutrition benefits to invest in the systems changes authorized by Chapter 151 of the Acts of 2000 and maximize the opportunity for SNAP enrollment.
