April	Full Senate unanimously passes bill.	Full Senate
April	<b>Senate 3rd Reading</b> gives bill back to full Senate with favorably report.	Senate 3rd Reading
1996 January	<b>Senate unanimously passes bill,</b> amends it, and sends to Senate Committee on 3rd Reading.	Full Senate
November	Senate Ways & Means redrafts bill, renumbers it S. 2108, and reports it out favorably to the Senate.	Senate Ways & Means
April	HUD <b>Committee reports bill out favorably</b> to Senate Ways & Means	
March	HUD <b>Committee holds public hearing</b> & MUPHT testifies.	Public Hearing
