## Name:

You and your family made a difficult and dangerous journey to get to the United States. Federal Agents at the Border released you so that you can apply for legal status in the United States. Following the instructions in this letter and reading all the forms in this packet will help you. If you do not understand the language these materials are written in, or you cannot read, please ask an officer for help and an interpreter will be provided to you for free.

## Right to Apply for Asylum

You have the right to apply for asylum and other protections that would allow you to stay in the United States. You will have the chance to tell your story to an Immigration Judge. The Judge will decide if you can stay in the United States.

## Report to ICE for Processing

The form Reporting to ICE after Release into the United States discusses how to schedule an appointment for a reporting date at a U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) Field Office near you. If you aren't sure which office to contact from the list on the back of the form, you can call 1-888-351-4024 and you will be told the closest office location.

You can bring an attorney or someone to help you at the appointment. Unless you have committed a serious crime, or the government thinks you may be a risk to the United States, YOU WILL NOT be taken into custody during the appointment.

When you report to the ICE Field Office:

- An officer will ask you for some information and get your fingerprints.
- you will get instructions about what to do next;
- you will get more information on how to find legal help and other resources; and
- you will get documents to help you find housing, services, education, and work.

## Report to Your Immigration Hearing

The Form I-862 (Notice to Appear) has the information that the government will use to discuss your case at your immigration court hearing. It includes: 1) your immigration charges and 2) the date, time, and address of the Immigration Court where you need to show up. It is very important that you tell ICE AND the Immigration Court if you change your address so we can mail any updates to your new address. In your packet are instructions on how to change your address with both ICE and the Immigration Court.

## FREE Legal Help

Many groups and attorneys provide FREE LEGAL HELP. In your packet is a letter about Legal Resources. It provides the names, phone numbers, and website links of several groups that may be able to help you.

## Reminder

It is very important that you report to the ICE Field Office, and you show up at your immigration court dates. This will help ensure the best possible outcome and allow you to be in the United States while you wait for the judge to hear your case.

If you have any questions about reporting, you can call the ICE at 1-888-351-4024 where they have operators who can help in several languages.



One Year Asylum Application Deadline: If you believe you may be eligible for asylum, you must file Form I-589, Application for Asylum and for Withholding of Removal. The Form I-589, instructions, and information on where to file the Form can be found at <a href="https://www.uscis.gov/i-589">www.uscis.gov/i-589</a>. Failure to file Form I-589 within one year of arrival may bar you from eligibility to apply for asylum pursuant to section 208(a)(2)(B) of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

# Reporting to ICE after Release into the United States



U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) releases some people with instructions to report to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) for continued processing. This document explains the general process you may encounter when reporting to ICE. It is not intended to provide legal advice or replace the information included in the forms referenced below. You need to review ALL your paperwork and understand your reporting obligations.

## **Step 1. Read and Review Your Forms**

CBP provided you a form with your personal information, fingerprint, and picture. The second page of this form instructs you to report to the ICE office nearest your destination within 60 days.

## DHS Form PD G-56 "Call-in Letter"

DHS Form PD G-56, or Call-in Letter, states that you are required to check-in with ICE officer. Your PD G-56 instructs you to report to your local ICE Office within 60 days of arrival into the United States.

On the back of this sheet is a list of offices, but you are encouraged to call 1-888-351-4024 to confirm the closest location for you to report.

## Reporting to ICE

Check-In Appointment. The middle section of your Form PD G-56 (see below) provides information about how to report to ICE. ICE recommends that you schedule your appointment online by visiting <a href="https://www.ice.gov/check-in">www.ice.gov/check-in</a>. You will need to use the <a href="mailto:Subject ID">Subject ID</a> and <a href="mailto:Country of Birth">Country of Birth</a> entered on your I-385 form. REASON FOR APPOINTMENT	You have been released in the discretion of U.S. Customs and Border Protection in the United States and are now required to contact you local ICE Field Office to complete processing.  Contacting ICE will ensure that DHS has your address and contact information up to date. Once you contact ICE for the first time, ICE will evaluate how you can meet the continuing filing requirements which may include mersons reporting. Failure to contact the local ICE office may lead to you being taken into custody or placed on additional forms of supervision or monitoring.
BRING WITH YOU	Identification document (birth certificate, government-issued identity documents such as a driver's license or cédula) and all immigration documents.

FAILURE TO CONTACT THE LOCAL ICE OFFICE AS INSTRUCTED MAY RESULT IN YOUR ARREST AND/OR A LOSS OF THE RIGHT TO ANY POSSIBLE RELIEF. THANK YOU FOR YOUR COOPERATION.

ICE will review your case and may require you to appear before an immigration court.

You may receive a Notice to Appear (NTA) in immigration court.

## **Reporting for Immigration Court**

Court Hearing. You may receive information by mail from the immigration court which will include a court address, room number, date, and time for your appearance in front of an Immigration Judge. You can call the Executive Office of Immigration Review (EOIR) at 1-800-898-7180 if you are unsure of your next court date.



If you fail to appear for your immigration court hearing, you may be ordered removed from the United States in your absence.

## Step 3. Comply with the Conditions of Your Release



## YOU MUST COMPLY WITH THE CONDITIONS OF YOUR RELEASE

You must review and comply with all conditions of your release, including reporting to the ICE office within 60 days.

To schedule your ICE check-in appointment, please visit <a href="https://www.ice.gov/check-in">www.ice.gov/check-in</a>. You will need to use the Subject ID and Country of Birth entered on your I-385 form. You may also contact the appropriate ICE Field Office using the contact information on the back of this flyer.



It is important to notify ICE <u>and</u> the immigration court of any change in address. If ICE and the immigration court do not have your current address, you may not receive important information about your case and may be detained and/or ordered removed from the United States. You must notify ICE and the Immigration court separately.

#### Notice to Respondent

Warning: Any statement you make may be used against you in removal proceedings.

**Alien Registration:** This copy of the Notice to Appear served upon you is evidence of your alien registration while you are in removal proceedings. You are required to carry it with you at all times.

**Representation:** If you so choose, you may be represented in this proceeding, at no expense to the Government, by an attorney or other individual authorized and qualified to represent persons before the Executive Office for Immigration Review, pursuant to 8 CFR 1003.16. Unless you so request, no hearing will be scheduled earlier than ten days from the date of this notice, to allow you sufficient time to secure counsel. A list of qualified attorneys and organizations who may be available to represent you at no cost will be provided with this notice.

Conduct of the hearing: At the time of your hearing, you should bring with you any affidavits or other documents that you desire to have considered in connection with your case. If you wish to have the testimony of any witnesses considered, you should arrange to have such witnesses present at the hearing. At your hearing you will be given the opportunity to admit or deny any or all of the allegations in the Notice to Appear, including that you are inadmissible or removable. You will have an opportunity to present evidence on your own behalf, to examine any evidence presented by the Government, to object, on proper legal grounds, to the receipt of evidence and to cross examine any witnesses presented by the Government. At the conclusion of your hearing, you have a right to appeal an adverse decision by the immigration judge. You will be advised by the immigration judge before whom you appear of any relief from removal for which you may appear eligible including the privilege of voluntary departure. You will be given a reasonable opportunity to make any such application to the immigration judge.

One-Year Asylum Application Deadline: If you believe you may be eligible for asylum, you must file a Form I-589, Application for Asylum and for Withholding of Removal. The Form I-589, Instructions, and information on where to file the Form can be found at <a href="https://www.uscis.gov/i-589">www.uscis.gov/i-589</a>. Failure to file the Form I-589 within one year of arrival may bar you from eligibility to apply for asylum pursuant to section 208(a)(2)(B) of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

Failure to appear: You are required to provide the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), in writing, with your full mailing address and telephone number. You must notify the Immigration Court and the DHS immediately by using Form EOIR-33 whenever you change your address or telephone number during the course of this proceeding. You will be provided with a copy of this form. Notices of hearing will be mailed to this address. If you do not submit Form EOIR-33 and do not otherwise provide an address at which you may be reached during proceedings, then the Government shall not be required to provide you with written notice of your hearing. If you fail to attend the hearing at the time and place designated on this notice, or any date and time later directed by the Immigration Court, a removal order may be made by the immigration judge in your absence, and you may be arrested and detained by the DHS.

Mandatory Duty to Surrender for Removal: If you become subject to a final order of removal, you must surrender for removal to your local DHS office, listed on the internet at <a href="http://www.ice.gov/contact/ero">http://www.ice.gov/contact/ero</a>, as directed by the DHS and required by statute and regulation. Immigration regulations at 8 CFR 1241.1 define when the removal order becomes administratively final. If you are granted voluntary departure and fail to depart the United States as required, fail to post a bond in connection with voluntary departure, or fail to comply with any other condition or term in connection with voluntary departure, you must surrender for removal on the next business day thereafter. If you do not surrender for removal as required, you will be ineligible for all forms of discretionary relief for as long as you remain in the United States and for ten years after your departure or removal. This means you will be ineligible for asylum, cancellation of removal, voluntary departure, adjustment of status, change of nonimmigrant status, registry, and related waivers for this period. If you do not surrender for removal as required, you may also be criminally prosecuted under section 243 of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

U.S. Citizenship Claims: If you believe you are a United States citizen, please advise the DHS by calling the ICE Law Enforcement Support Center toll free at (855) 448-6903.

Sensitive locations: To the extent that an enforcement action leading to a removal proceeding was taken against Respondent at a location described in 8 U.S.C. § 1229(e)(1), such action complied with 8 U.S.C. § 1367.

#### Purpose:

You are being asked to sign and date this Notice to Appear (NTA) as an acknowledgement of personal receipt of this notice. This notice, when filed with the U.S. Department of Justice's (DOJ) Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR), initiates removal proceedings. The NTA contains information regarding the nature of the proceedings against you, the legal authority under which proceedings are conducted, the acts or conduct alleged against you to be in violation of law, the charges against you, and the statutory provisions alleged to have been violated. The NTA also includes information about the conduct of the removal hearing, your right to representation at no expense to the government, the requirement to inform EOIR of any change in address, the consequences for failing to appear, and that generally, if you wish to apply for asylum, you must do so within one year of your arrival in the United States. If you choose to sign and date the NTA, that information will be used to confirm that you received it, and for recordkeeping.

#### **Routine Uses:**

For United States Citizens, Lawful Permanent Residents, or individuals whose records are covered by the Judicial Redress Act of 2015 (5 U.S.C. § 552a note), your information may be disclosed in accordance with the Privacy Act of 1974, 5 U.S.C. § 552a(b), including pursuant to the routine uses published in the following DHS systems of records notices (SORN): DHS/USCIS/ICE/CBP-001 Alien File, Index, and National File Tracking System of Records, DHS/USCIS-007 Benefit Information System, DHS/ICE-011 Criminal Arrest Records and Immigration Enforcement Records (CARIER), and DHS/ICE-003 General Counsel Electronic Management System (GEMS), and DHS/CBP-023 Border Patrol Enforcement Records (BPER). 





\* 2. Mail the original Change of Address form to the Immigration Court. (*This can also be completed online at https://www.justice.gov/eoir/form-eoir-33-eoir-immigration-court-listing*)

3. Mail one copy of the Change of Address form to the ICE Attorneys. To find the address of the ICE attorneys, go to: https://www.ice.gov/contact/field-offices?
office=12 and look for the state and city of your new address.

- Provide one copy of the Change of Address Form to your ICE Officer at check-in.
- Keep one copy of the Change of Address form in a safe place for your records.
- You will need to complete a Change of Address form for each member of your family who is in Immigration Court proceedings.

You should send the documents via certified mail so you have proof that you sent them. This means that you request a receipt be returned to you as proof that you sent the documents. You can send certified mail from any post office.

After you have sent the documents keep calling 1-800-898-7180

to verify the date and location of your next hearing before the Immigration Court.

The immigration court will only make any change(s) to your address and phone number in EOIR's records upon receipt of this form; the immigration court will not change your address or phone number based on a different address or phone number on pleadings, motions, or other communications with the court.

If you fail to appear at any hearing before an immigration judge when notice of that hearing or other official correspondence was served on you or sent to the address you provided, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) may take you into custody. In addition, the immigration court may conduct your hearing in your absence and enter an order of removal, deportation, or exclusion against you. If the court enters such an order, you may be ineligible for certain forms of relief from removal under the Immigration and Nationality Act as follows:

If you are in *removal* proceedings: You will be subject to an order of removal for a period of ten years after the date of entry of the final order. You may also become ineligible for voluntary departure, cancellation of removal, and adjustment of status or change of status.

If you are in *deportation* proceedings: You will be subject to an order of deportation for a period of five years after the date of the entry of the final order. You may also become ineligible for voluntary departure, suspension of deportation or voluntary departure, and adjustment of status or change of status.

If you are in exclusion proceedings: Your application for admission to the United States may be considered withdrawn.
