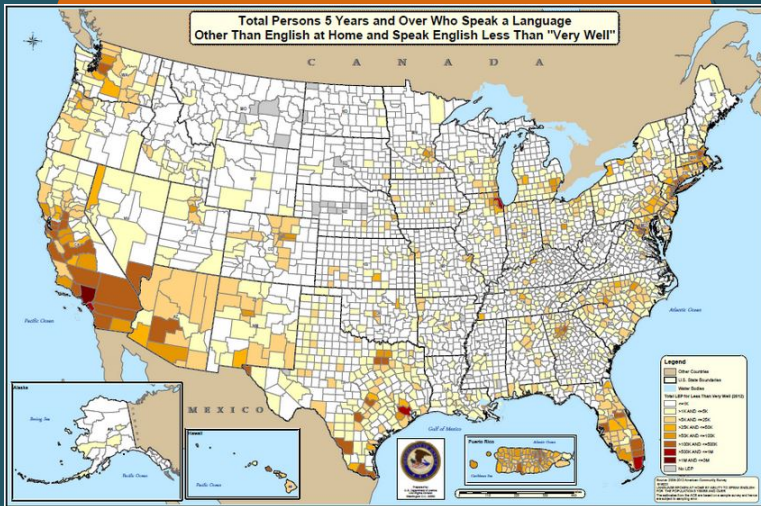


MAPPING LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENT COMMUNITIES IN MASSACHUSETTS

HOW CAN WE HELP?

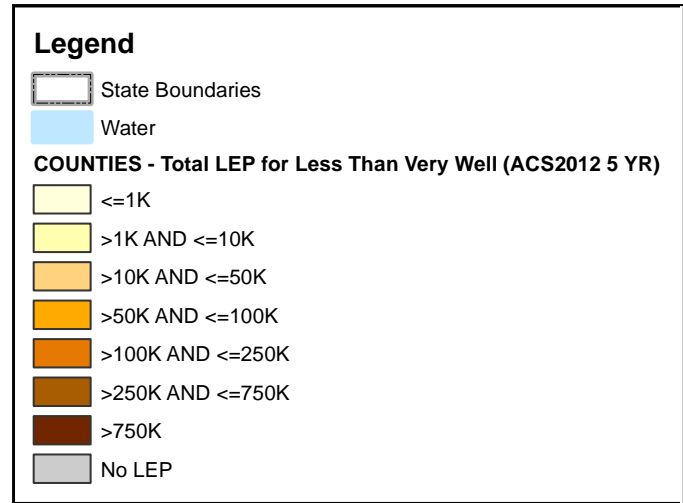
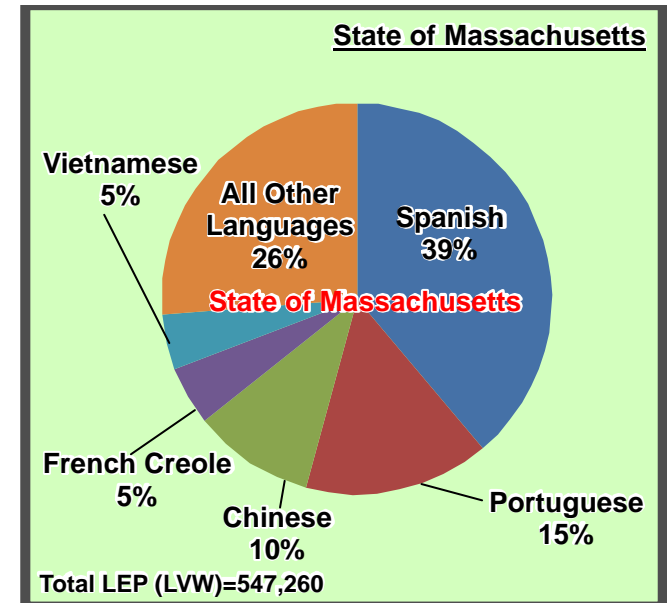
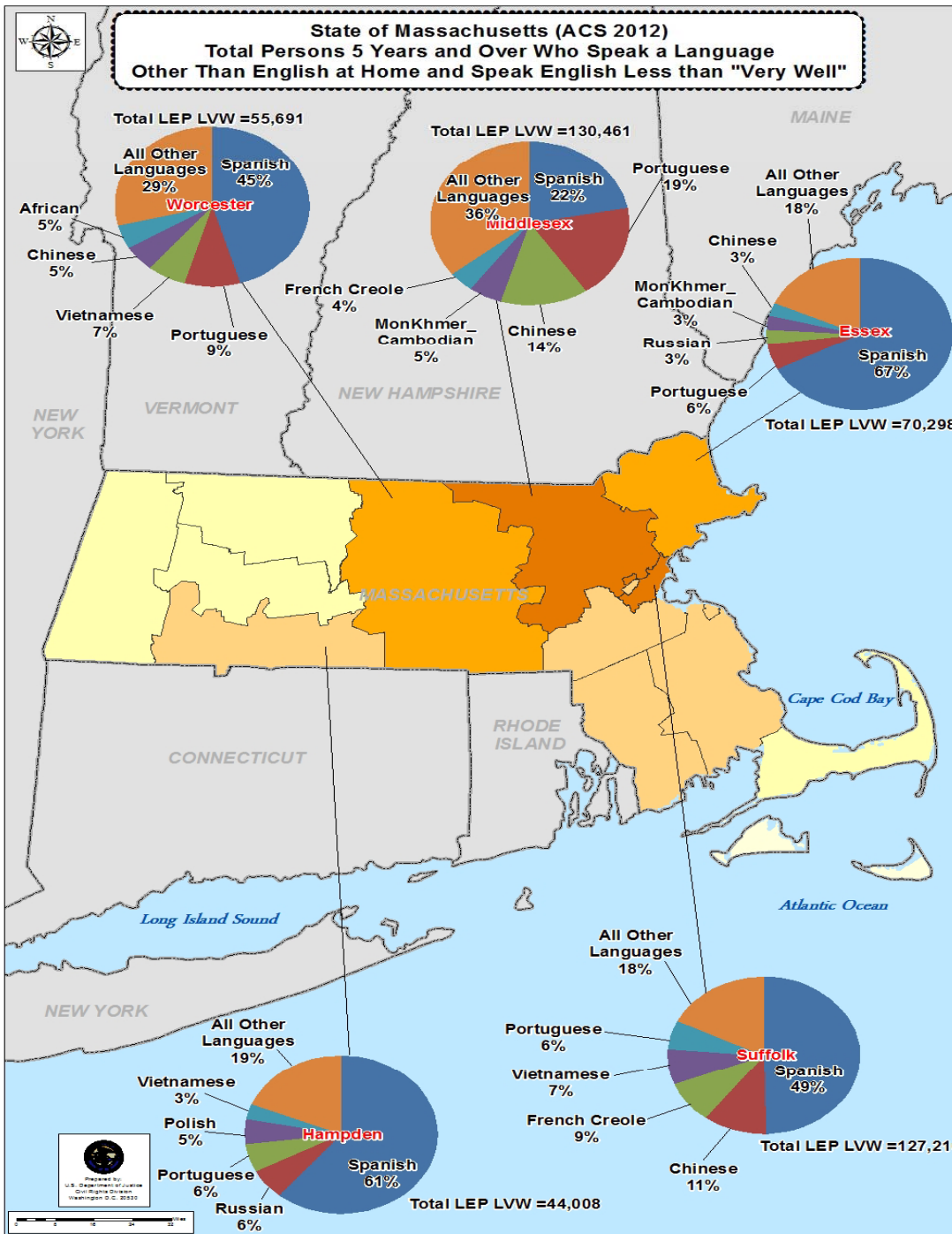
